Sunday, September 27, 2 pm, "Pedro E. Guerrero: A Photographer's Journey"

See a new American Masters documentary about a Mexican American born and raised in segregated Mesa, Arizona, who became an extraordinary international photographer. The program uses Guerrero's words and images to explore his collaborations with three of the most iconic American artists of the 20th century: architect Frank Lloyd Wright and sculptors Alexander Calder and Louise Nevelson. Following the film, architectural photographer Kirk Gittings of Albuquerque leads a discussion.
